



Q & A with Ryan O'Reilly

Can you give us a sense about growing up in Huron County? We lived just outside of Brucefield. We had an old school house, and an old barn out there. I can remember the barn, upstairs was like a hockey arena and the downstairs was a puck shooting area. We had hardwood floors and had the mini-sticks going constantly. I think every single place of that property we played hockey on.

I can remember the being able to put on my roller blades, grab a ball and go down the country roads and stick handle with the ball and get a good work out in. It was just a cool area. It was pretty peaceful.

Did you and your brother push each other?

One of the biggest reasons I think I



was able to play at the high level and get to where I'm at now is because of my brother (Cal). He never said no. He's 4-and-a-half years older than me and he never said no to me coming to play with his friends. For me, I got a chance to play with these guys that are all bigger, better and stronger than I am. And it gave me a platform to grow.

Who was that person in the community that gave you that final push to get you to the next level? Since winning the cup, I've had a lot of reflection and you think about how many people in Huron County, whether it be Goderich, Seaforth or Clinton, and all these areas that have done so many little things that have made a big impact. The staff at the Seaforth arena were extremely incredible when there was open ice letting me and my brother go and skate. And I remember it was Grade 7 and 8. I used to bike down at lunch hour and skate at the rink for a half hour when I could. It's where I fell in love with the game. Those are some of the greatest experiences of hockey I have ever had. Just being out there by myself on the ice, listening to music and dreaming of winning a Stanley Cup and playing in the NHL.

How much of a role did family play in your moving away from home from the OHL and onwards?

Family is the staple. My parents are obviously two amazing people and my dad, especially for my career. It wasn't easy. There were definitely times where you're sad and miss home and whether it's hockey not going well or school and you want to go back home where you're comfortable. My parents, being able to talk to them, helped me get back to just loving the game and loving the opportunity and to keep going, knowing I'll get through it.

It's a short summer when you win a championship. What do you do for an encore, how do you keep focused?

Right now I'm really just trying to enjoy it. I think I played 108 games last year and it's a lot. It's trying mentally to get away from it. You already start to think of how you're going to ramp it up again but I'm excited. It's the greatest job in the world to play hockey and I don't think it will be that hard to get moving again.

The competition, playing the games and fighting along side the guys I played with, that was the best part of winning the cup.

What has the experience been like since winning the Stanley Cup?

It's pretty amazing. I don't think it's sunk in yet, so many great things have happened. Realizing that dream that is so tough to do and it happened so fast. Being to celebrate it with the city of St. Louis, my friends and family especially back home and just having the county behind me, it's a dream come true.

At what point in the playoffs did the team realize they have a real good chance to win?

Being the first time I've ever won a playoff series, it was very educational for myself on how even keel you have to stay. You win one game and you feel like you're going to win the cup, then you lose one game and then it's like you have to regroup and change a lot of things.

Winning the conference finals and sitting in the room with all of the guys and we're in shock and it's like we have a chance to do it here so it's been a crazy process.

What was it like when you were younger, trying to crack an elite line up in a bigger Hicenter, coming from Huron County? One thing I love about Huron County is you have the smaller centers, then you have the Huron-Perth Lakers, a huge piece that helped surround myself with good competition and was able to play tournaments all over the country.





Taxes & Utilities

Property Taxation & Assessment, Utility Billing

Municipality of Huron East Tax notices are sent out twice a year; the interim bill in early March and the final bill in early September. Each bill contains two instalment dates. The 2019 instalment dates are as follows: September 30th, and November 29th, 2019.

Utility notices are sent out quarterly, with each bill containing the amount owing and the due date. The 2019 utility due dates are as follows: September 30th, and December 27th, 2019.

It is the responsibility of the property owner to ensure payment is received at the municipal office on or before these due dates to avoid penalty. If making payments by telephone or electronically, please allow for processing time as payments must be received in the municipal office on or before the due date to avoid penalty charges.

E-Billing

The Municipality of Huron East offers e-billing for utility bills, tax bills, and accounts receivable bills. If you would like to receive your bills from Huron East via email, please download the application from huroneast.com, visit us in the municipal office, or contact the property tax clerk, utility clerk, or accounts payable clerk at 519-527-0160.

Pre-Authorized Payment Plans

One of the easiest ways to pay your property taxes and utility bills is through a pre-authorized payment plan. Both taxes and utilities can be set up to be deducted from your bank account on the due dates. Property taxes can also be set up as a monthly deduction.

To enrol in a pre-authorized program, your account(s) must be current. Please download the application from www.huroneast.com, come into the municipal office, or contact the tax clerk or utility clerk at 519-527-0160.

Dog Tags & Dog Ownership Information

Every dog owner within the Municipality of Huron East is required to obtain a dog tag annually on or before February 28th, or within 15 days of becoming a dog owner. If a tag is not purchased prior to March 1st, a late fee of \$15 per dog will apply, in addition to the price of the tag. Not only does this practice demonstrate responsible pet ownership, it also helps with the identification and safe return of your pet. Applications for dog tags can be found at huroneast.com, or in the municipal office.

The owner shall keep the tags securely fixed on the dog at all times, until renewed or replaced. All dogs must be leashed or under control when not on the owner's property. If a dog strays, it may be impounded at the owner's expense for "Running at Large."

No more than two (2) dogs may be harboured, at any time, in a dwelling unit located in the urban areas of the municipality. No more than three (3) dogs may be harboured, at any time, in a dwelling unit located in the rural areas of the municipality.

Any dog owner who fails to license their dog(s) in the Municipality of Huron East for the current year is guilty of an offense, and, on conviction, is liable to a fine of \$125, pursuant of the Provincial Offense Act, R.S.O. 1990, CP. 33, as amended.

Public Works

Municipal Road Safety

For the safety of motorists, and to ensure proper drainage, municipal road allowances are not to be planted with crops. Any road allowances that are currently tilled should be restored to a grassed area, as crops planted on municipal property may be removed. The average road allowance is 66 feet. If you have any further questions about road allowances, please contact the Public Works Department at 519-527-1710.

Please do not blow grass onto the municipal sidewalks and roadways. On sidewalks it is unsightly and after a rain creates a slip and fall hazard to pedestrians. In urban areas it collects in catch basins and leads to possible flooding. On all roads it creates a hazard for bike and motorcycle operators and is an offence (Section 180 Highway Traffic Act).

Owners with Sump Pumps

It is illegal to pump storm water from eaves troughs or basement sump pumps into the sanitary sewer. By eliminating infiltrating storm water from the sanitary sewer system, it will help with sewage plant capacity and reduce treatment costs by not treating storm water. Sump pumps should discharge water directly onto the ground and away from neighbouring properties.

Watering Restrictions

Please be reminded that because of high water demands on our water systems during the summer months (May 1st to October 31st), and in an effort to promote good water conservation practices, we request all residents in the communities of Brucefield, Brussels, Egmondville, Seaforth, and Vanastra to refrain from excessive outdoor water usage (watering of lawns/gardens, washing vehicles, filling pools, etc.).

We also request that outdoor watering takes place as follows:

Even numbered houses water on even numbered days (7:00 - 9:00 in the morning or evening). Odd numbered houses water on odd numbered days (7:00 - 9:00 in the morning or evening).

Building Permits

Building permits are typically required in the Municipality of Huron East for the following:

- All new buildings and additions to buildings

Supplies for Your Family for 72 Hours

- Non-perishable food items. Canned food such as soups, stews, baked beans, pasta, meat, fish, fruit. Crackers and biscuits, honey, peanut butter, jam.
- Manual Can opener (bottle opener)
- Bottled water. 4 L per person per day. (2 for drinking & 2 for hygiene and washing)
- Crank or battery operated Radio.
- Flashlight with batteries.
- Candles and matches (lighter)
- Family First Aid kit.
- Personal hygiene items (Toilet paper, feminine products, hand sanitizer, etc.)
- Pocket knife or multi-tool.
- Whistle
- Cash (small bills and change)
- Special needs items for babies, pets, elderly. (as required)
- Garbage bags and zip-lock bags.
- Duct tape.
- Copies of important papers (insurance, medications, family contacts, etc.)
- Emergency document holder.
- Spare phone or tablet charger.

SEVERE SUMMER WEATHER How to Stay Safe in Thunderstorms

When Thunder Roars, Go Indoors!

Remember, severe thunderstorms can produce tornadoes.

Be Weather Aware!

When planning your daily activities its important to be prepared for severe weather. Summer weather has a tendency to be more volatile than other seasons. It can be less predictable, with less lead time for preparedness. Its always a better idea to plan ahead.

Tips on Preparing for Severe Weather

- Don't wait for a storm to hit. Begin preparing now and you'll be able to react quickly when a storm arrives. Make sure your Home Emergency Survival Kit is stocked, ready, and in a place where you can easily access it.
- Pay close attention to the weather. Some types of nasty summer weather can develop quickly with little warning, so be sure to regularly check the forecast on trusted sources including radio, smartphone apps, or the internet.
- 3. Respect the potentially destructive power or weather. When severe weather is forecast, keep a close eye on the sky and be prepared to take cover if threatening weather approaches. Stay inside until conditions have calmed and the danger has passed. This is no time for recreational weather watching or taking photos or video to post on social media.
- 4. Remember that after-storm conditions can also pose a hazard. After a severe storm has passed used special care when you leave your shelter. There may be downed electrical wires, broken trees and dangerous debris around your property and in the streets. Be extremely cautious if you decide to tackle tree removal by yourself. Better yet, leave it to the professionals.

Severe Thunderstorm

A **Watch** is issued when conditions are likely for the development of thunderstorms, some of which may become severe with large hail, heavy rain, deadly lightning or damaging winds and possibly tornadoes within the areas and times specified in the watch. You should use this time to secure loose objects, shelter animals, ensure family members or co-workers are prepared to take action and listen carefully for an updated weather report. This is the time to develop a plan.

A **Warning** is issued when a severe storm has developed producing one or more of the following conditions: flooding rain, destructive winds with gusts greater than 90 km/h, hail of at least 20 mm in diameter (the size of a nickel) or intense lightning. Severe thunderstorms may also produce tornadoes. The storm's expected motion and developments will be given in the warning. If you are in the area specified, be prepared to take shelter.



SPECIAL WEATHER STATEMENT

A Special Weather Statement means actual or expected weather conditions may cause general inconvenience or concern, but do not pose a serious threat to warrant a weather warning.

Tornado

Tornadoes are rotating columns of high-velocity wind that can bring devastation to anything in their path. Ontario averages 12 tornadoes per year, most occurring in June, July and August, although the season extends from April to September.

When a Tornado Threatens

- Take shelter immediately, away from doors, windows or exterior walls. The basement of a sturdy building is best.
- Don't get caught in a vehicle or mobile home. If no other shelter is available then lie flat in a ditch, ravine or low-lying area.
- Beware of flying debris. Even small objects such as sticks and straw can become lethal missiles.



Tornado Watch vs Warning

A **Tornado Watch** is issued when severe thunderstorms have developed and there is the possibility of one or more tornadoes developing within the areas and times specified in the watch.

A **Tornado Warning** is issued when one or more tornadoes are occurring in the area specified or detected on Doppler Radar. The expected motion, development and duration of the tornado will be given in the warning. You should take immediate action to get to a safe location.



FARM EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS How to be Prepared for Emergencies



Protecting your farm involves a number of considerations:

family members, co-workers or employees, livestock, crops, buildings and equipment.

Planning ahead for all-hazard situations can help to minimize the impact and speed the recovery process for you and your farm.

Gather information. What disasters or hazards are most likely in your community? For your farm? How would you be warned? How should you prepare for each?

Before the Emergency

- Draw a farm site map and indicate: buildings and structures, access routes (roads, lanes), barriers (fences, gates), locations of livestock, hazardous substances, electrical shutoff locations, etc.
- Make a list of your farm inventory, including livestock (species, number of animals), crops (acres, type), machinery and equipment (make, model #), hazardous substances (e.g., pesticides, fertilizers, compressed gas cylinders, fuels, medicines, other chemicals).
- Keep a list of emergency phone numbers, such as your veterinarian, insurance agent, etc.
- Make a list of suppliers or businesses providing services to your farm: livestock or milk transport, feed delivery, fuel delivery, etc.
- Contact your insurance agent. Review your insurance coverage. Get additional coverage for "all-hazard" situations (e.g. flood, hail damage).
- Identify areas to relocate your assets (e.g., higher elevation), if needed.
 Plan for livestock, tractors and equipment, feed, grain, hay, agrochemicals (e.g., pesticides, herbicides).
- Prepare farm employees. Inform them of the farm's emergency plan; review it with them regularly. Identify shelter-in-place or evacuation locations.
- Establish a phone tree with contact information for all employees.


